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The Oceania Province and the Edmund Rice Network in Oceania

A Statement from the Oceania Leadership Team

The Oceania Leadership Team has had several conversations about the Edmund Rice Network in Oceania. In February 2011, we attempted to articulate our common understanding of the Network and furthered the discussion with the Life and Mission Team Directors.

People naturally want to form connections. People connect to the Network when they experience an attraction felt deep in their heart. The attraction is to charism. This may occur in a variety of ways. Some examples would be:

- through an encounter with someone in the Network who is filled with commitment and zeal,
- through meeting someone whose life has been changed through involvement in a particular group, eg an Edmund Rice Camp,
- through experiencing the culture and philosophy of a group or institution within the Network.

This Statement articulates our current understanding of the Edmund Rice Network in Oceania. This statement is a result of that discussion and represented the combined position currently held by the Oceania Leadership Team and its Life and Mission Team Directors.

1. The charism of Edmund is fundamentally linked to the Christian story. For Christians, the expression of the charism finds its fullest meaning when it is based on gospel values. For those of other faiths, the charism can be a stepping stone to a deeper awareness, understanding and expression of their faith tradition. For others the charism can be the stepping stone to a greater appreciation of humanist or natural world philosophies. For others the story of Edmund's life is sufficient motivation for them to establish and maintain a connection in the network.

2. Rather than being a formalised, constituted structure, the Edmund Rice Network in Oceania is a relational and organic web which connects not only the groups within the Oceania Province but also groups and institutions independent of the governance of Oceania Province (such as EREA or Townsville ER Camps). It is thus a web of connections between the various groups, communities and institutions that identify with Edmund Rice.

The outcomes of the gathering were extremely fruitful.



All regions of Edmund Rice Camps across Oceania gathered in February at beautiful Mulgoa, Sydney, for the ERC Passion conference, themed “Why we do the things we do?”

Up to 5 volunteers and a staff member from each region represented their Edmund Rice Camps. These included ERC’s from Western Australia, South Australia, Tasmania, Victoria, New South Wales, Queensland (including Brisbane, Bundaberg and Townsville), Auckland and Dunedin.

Each ERC had its own story to tell, length of time of operation (30 years to 12 months), variations in type of camp with disadvantaged children, unique traditions, difference in size of budget, number of staff, groups that they reach out to and the time of the year they run camps.

Regardless of this all felt they knew each other within a couple of quick get to know you games. The thirst of the volunteers to learn about how other ERC’s operate was incredible and showed no signs of using the opportunity to spruik about their own ERC or present with the presumption that their region knows best.

The gathering was programmed to imitate a typical camp. The fun, the positivity, the selflessness and desire to connect with people that is evident on every ERC was also present within this programme. Some volunteers at the start expressed interest in connecting with like-minded people who live in another part of Oceania because they find Eddie Rice people so individual, unique and simply understand another Eddie Ricer without having to say too much.

The outcomes of the gathering were extremely fruitful. A case in point was a commitment made for a group of volunteers to plan and facilitate how volunteers can camp across Oceania with more ease and structure. Another group planned and actioned how the group can continue to resource each other with games, songs, programs, formation ideas, trainings, fundraising ideas and support of each other’s volunteering.

In other words this gathering allowed ERC volunteers to network with each other. This networking was expressed in exchanging current and new ideas, in highlighting personal experiences, in sharing passion for something they believe in, through culture to deepen each other’s operation, establishing frameworks to make things easier and recognising barriers. By doing this the participating volunteers supported each other’s journey.

This conference took a risk to think these eleven (11) Edmund Rice Camp Groups that are so similar could find differences and harness them to deepen each other’s organisation while not finding conflict, struggle or head-locking. However, typical of Eddie Rice volunteers, staff and organisations, the gathering had nothing but an abundant amount of energy, optimism, faith and passion for what ERC provides to the Oceania Network.

New Pathways

In 2010 the Oceania Leadership Team initiated a consultation process to explore people's hopes for possible pathways of commitment to the charism of Edmund Rice.

The aim of this consultation was to gather information about the various connections to the charism that exist today and to provide the opportunity for individuals to express their hopes for connections with or commitment to the charism into the future.

The process began with the Regional Networking Coordinators inviting expressions of interest from those people wanting to explore the possibility of a formal connection with the charism. Seventy seven people came forward wishing to take part in the process.

The information gathered in this consultation showed that the participants were hoping for a connection with or commitment to the charism of Edmund Rice by:

- Contributing to and/or being connected with the mission of Edmund Rice (Presence, Compassion, Liberation and Justice) within the circumstances of their lives.
- Receiving a formal acknowledgement of their commitment. This may involve receiving a certificate, making a public statement or vow, wearing a symbol and/or participating in ritual, prayer and gatherings.
- Being a staff member/board member in an Edmund Rice school or ministry.
- Participating in opportunities for families and married people.
- Encouraging and supporting others in their expression of charism.
- Living in community with others inspired by the charism.
- Participating in cross-cultural immersion experiences or supporting overseas ministries.
- Being involved in and aware of ecological issues and our connection with creation.
- Becoming a vowed member of the Christian Brothers.
- Supporting elderly brothers.
- Publicly promoting Edmund Rice and the Edmund Rice Network.
- Having a shared mission with other faiths and agencies.
- Offering support in service work best practice.

The Oceania Leadership Team was delighted with the level of interest in the new pathways and has decided to continue and support the project into 2011.

The aim of the project for this year is to provide the opportunity for individuals to come together to reflect upon and share ideas relating to possible pathways with others who are inspired by the charism. Through this sharing it is hoped that new pathways emerge and become clearer enabling the spirit of Jesus and Edmund to continue to grow.

Oceania Reflects Upon Itself

The Directors of Oceania Province's Life and Mission Teams as well as regional managers and coordinators gathered in Mulgoa to explore our collective identity as Oceania.

Our hope was to make new meaning around our roles and relationships. As a group of seekers we listened to each other's stories and opened our hearts and minds to an alternative view of reality.

On the first day images and experiences of Oceania were examined. Br Peter Harney challenged us to expand our thinking and to adopt new ways of understanding Oceania and our work within the Province. Peter's work around prophetic leadership and the universe story opened our eyes and hearts to potential that is released when cooperative approaches are used and communication is fluid.

There were opportunities for regional groups and Life and Mission Teams to meet, to discern the implications of Peter's presentation and to share developments within the regions and the teams.

The potential for regional groups to connect spiritually and to integrate their professional work was explored through story, imagery and ritual.

The gathering also provided the opportunity for dialogue. Two significant dialogues occurred on the second day. Our critical friend throughout this day was Peter Hancock. Peter listened deeply to the perspectives that were shared and fed back to the group his insights.

The first dialogue was termed *Shaping Identity - the Edmund Rice Network*; the second dialogue was termed *Resourcing Mission – Spirituality, Stewardship and Service*.

Participants presented their unique perspectives, engaged in a fish-bowl approach to explore similarities of perspective as well as points of difference. All participants had the opportunity to offer comment. As a result of the dialogues, greater clarity was achieved and issues for further resolution were identified.

A number of rituals were celebrated during the gathering. On Sunday night participants enjoyed an Emmaus Walk to the Shepherd's Hut during which experiences were shared, insights gathered and Welcome to Country was formalised.

On Monday night we acknowledged and affirmed the messages contained within two new documents: *Towards a Missiology Framework* and the *Ministry Characteristics*.

The closing ritual was a meditation upon the Rainbow Serpent and the life-giving moments of one's personal, family and community journeys.

Justice Challenges for the Edmund Rice Network

In my line of employment I am privileged to work with a lot of inspiring people who are genuinely trying to make a positive impact in the world.

Some of these people are the very families we work with, fighting the social stigmas and inequality today's media, and the world, have placed on them. While others are the organisations assisting these families through support, education and advocacy for the right of all people to live happy and fulfilling lives.

In the Edmund Rice Network we are very fortunate that we don't have to look too far to see these people working with and around us.

In our office in Homebush West, we are lucky to be working next to the Edmund Rice Centre for Justice, with Phil Glendenning as the Director. Daily I see many different people walking in and out of the centre. Some come in to volunteer for one of the many projects the centre is working on, others to buy fair-trade goods, some to gain further information on different issues and some looking for much needed assistance.

Whatever the reason is, it is great to work with and near such a dynamic and life-changing organisation that attracts such passionate and generous people.

I recently attended a Year 10 Social Justice Day at an Edmund Rice school. At the beginning of the day I listened to Phil Glendenning speak to the entire year for about 45mins on three important groups of people that the Justice Centre, ER Camps, Oceania Province and other groups in the Edmund Rice Network, are working with.

The First People – Indigenous Australians

Phil mentioned that for many years Indigenous people have been fighting for an equal playing field in society. There have been some steps towards this through different Reconciliation events, most notably the 'Sorry speech' by Kevin Rudd in 2008. But there is still a lot more to be done and while we have moved forward, have we become static again?

It would be naive to think that injustices no longer occur in communities around Australia. We still see them on our camps, in playgrounds and workplaces.

The Last People – Refugees / Asylum Seekers

Phil shared terrible stories of people who were trying to seek asylum in Australia that were sent back home, back into the hostile environment they were trying to flee.

He mentioned the many families that had lost loved ones (many young children) through acts that are only seen in the movies here.

The boys were silent and fixated on these stories and the passion of Phil's work was clearly visible.

The Next People – People from the Islands of the Pacific

We heard about Kiribati and the effects that global warming is having on all the Pacific nations around that area. Places which many people have not heard of, places I didn't know existed before working in the Edmund Rice Network.

Phil spoke once again of avoidable deaths, due to disease and infections through rising sea levels. The idea of being ankle deep in water during high tide and living with that day-in and day-out really brought some awareness to these boys.

This was the perfect way to begin the Social Justice Day, and it gave all involved a greater perspective and appreciation for what they have in their lives. It also armed everyone with the knowledge and motivation to continue these good works in whatever capacity.

It is often said that the youth of today are our future, but this implies that they haven't got a spot in the present. We need to engage our young people to do more and feel like they can do more, because as we know, power in numbers is more effective than a lone battle.

We have to keep the 'people' in the forefront of our minds, it's not just a story or issue we can debate and pass judgement on. It's someone's life, family, past and most importantly their future.

A Reflection by Lynne Moten Edmund Rice Network

I worked at an Edmund Rice School for many years – I loved my work, was passionate about the school, and was thoroughly enriched by relationships and formation within the Edmund Rice Network.

The Charism of Edmund Rice and the work of the Edmund Rice Network will always be a remarkably important part of my life.

Through a series of events, I moved to Seymour College, a Uniting Church School, as the Director of Service Learning.

What I have been delighted to discover is that, although no longer at an Edmund Rice School, I am still very much a part of the Edmund Rice Network – that my passion for the Charism of Edmund Rice is still encouraged, supported and nourished in my relationships with others engaged in the Edmund Rice Network.

What has been even more significant, is how warmly the Edmund Rice Network have welcomed my students from Seymour College. It shows me over and over again how Edmund Rice's mission can be shared and embraced so broadly... even the boundaries of religion diminish.

The capacity for transformation and liberation through the Edmund Rice Network is beyond our wildest imagining.

Since moving to Seymour, I have organised an annual Indian Pilgrimage, called Sarvodaya. (Sarvodaya was the name suggested to us, by the Brothers in Bajpe, Karnataka. "Sarvodaya" is a word first coined by Ghandi, meaning "general uplift" or "wellbeing of all").

This most recent trip was a huge success on all levels, and is evidence of the unconfined nature of the Edmund Rice Charism. Many times through our pilgrimage through India, we were hosted by and worked alongside the Christian Brothers. Hearing the Seymour girls reflect on their experiences, particularly in light of their time with the Christian Brothers, has brought home how vital the work of the Edmund Rice Network is in our world, and how the qualities and relationships of the Edmund Rice Network can overcome any boundary.

The Brothers and Fathers of the schools and orphanages are AMAZING! The sing-alongs in Bajpe with all the Brothers together is one experience I will never forget for as long as I live. Brother Roshan on guitar and Brother Theo singing and teaching us some of their songs, and then learning ours. Brother Hector, Brother Miles and the two candidate brothers Aaron and Stig also joining in, and at one stage also getting up to dance with a tea towel as a prop.

I know that although I do not get to see them all the time, they are always in our thoughts and hearts as we are now with them. Teagan Helgeson

“Not only EREA but also each individual school and institution within EREA is part of the Edmund Rice Network.

EREA has a significant role in building up and supporting the wider network as it will often be the first point of contact for staff, students and families with the Edmund Rice Network.

With such a responsibility for building the network, the various school communities build relationships with the other groups in the Network such as for example Edmund Rice Camps, Justice Centres, Brothers' communities, and individual Oceania Province ministries and projects both in Australia and beyond Australia.

The Network also provides opportunities for young people from EREA once they leave school to become involved in immersion, volunteer and spirituality groups and Edmund Rice ministry.

The networking relationship is a very important one to foster for the future of the Edmund Rice Charism”.

3. The Edmund Rice Network consists of clearly defined groups as well as individuals who wish to connect with this network. Groups include Brothers' communities, Edmund Rice communities, schools, institutions, ministries, groups that gather, camps, reflection groups and justice groups.
4. The Network is not limited to the Oceania Province and the mission of Oceania Province.
5. The Edmund Rice mission is inspired by Edmund's vision which was grounded in gospel values.
6. The Oceania Leadership Team encourages all groups to have a clear sense of their mission, identity, the particular emphasis they draw from the Edmund Rice inspiration, and the need to connect with the network. Specific groups or sections may tend to emphasise a particular aspect of Edmund's inspiration or charism.
7. The documents of the Christian Brothers' Congregation Chapter and Oceania Province chapter are foundational for the vision of the Oceania Province. We would hope that such documents prove inspirational for other groups. In the same way we look to the visionary reflections of groups in the Edmund Rice Network who are not part of the province to inspire us and offer insight.
8. We encourage a culture where each group looks to the wisdom of the other groups to broaden and enliven its visioning.
9. Every group within the Network has the responsibility for effective networking. At this stage in our history, the Oceania Province has a role in ensuring the potential development for networking while working towards a future of ERN self sustainability. We would see it important that the costs of networking, conferencing and formation opportunities are eventually met by the groups within the Network.
10. In terms of commitment, the OLT supports the development of the Pathways Project as an authentic process which will enable individual people and groups to explore possible new formal form(s) of commitment through the charism.
11. Formation is integral to the ongoing development of both the groups and the Network.
12. We would see the role of the Networking Directorate as key in terms of building the relationships, connections and sense of network among all groups and individuals who identify with the Edmund Rice charism and not just those groups under the governance of the province. This is done through communication, newsletters, social networking, websites and gatherings.
13. Networking is not just about the Edmund Rice Network but also includes developing links and partnerships with other groups and organisations.

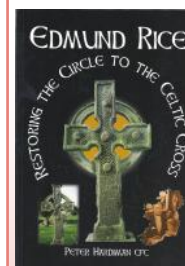
